- **1. Community Programs** funded programs delivered at no cost to participants that effect cultural change within our community through the power of the arts, resulting in improved social, emotional and health outcomes.
- **2. Workshops at Bluebird House** a social enterprise providing user-pays arts workshops to the community. All revenue generated is used to support our Community Programs.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS



As a community arts organisation we embrace the notion that our projects are collaborative and needs-based, and we ensure that they are supported by exceptional professional artists who guide, teach and inspire.

We take pride in our hands-on approach and create unique arts projects that are tailored to the needs of participants.

Drawn Together | Geelong brought youth from diverse cultural backgrounds together with local artists, Liz McGrath and Laura Alice. Through weekly art classes and workshops held at The fOrT youth centre and North Geelong Secondary College, the young artists explored a wide range of artistic styles, techniques and art materials.

Harnessing the power of augmented reality art, the young people created a collaborative public exhibition to celebrate Harmony Week in 2019. The exhibition was officially opened on Harmony Day by Cr Jim Mason and the Youth Commissioner for the Victorian Multicultural Commission, Ms Khayshie Ramesh. The celebration included singing by the Karenni Choir, cello music by Liz Findlay, a shared feast and a crowded room of guests using smartphones and tablets to view the augmented reality artworks through the EyeJack app.

DRAWN TOGETHER | ANIMATED

A group of young Karen and Karenni women developed a love of animation as they prepared the augmented reality artworks under the guidance of Laura Alice for an exhibition to celebrate Harmony Week 2019. They set a goal to create an animated short film. Weekly workshops at The fOrT have allowed them to create the hand-drawn artworks that fill each frame, and develop their skills in storytelling and animation. The film is a celebration of resilience, the power of identity, mystical encounters with ancestors, and the Karen and Karenni refugee experience.

THE FOLK HOUSE

The Folk House continued in 2019, paying tribute to the great tradition of community folk dance. The second energetic event in the series of four free dance events had Barwon Heads locals moving, laughing, and connecting through the joy of dance. Eklezmic brought traditional Klezmer tunes to the seaside town at the height of summer. Holidaymakers, experienced dancers and beginners alike were lured into the heady mix of music, fun and movement as the band played their irresistible style of traditional Yiddish folk. The Mongolian Fishmongers roused the winter crowd at The Monastery in Breakwater with Scottish and Irish tunes, and in Spring Eklezmic returned, taking dancers on a stirring journey around the folk traditions of Eastern Europe.

With live music by local musicians and delicious suppers accompanying each family-friendly, all-abilities dance event, The Folk House was a joyful celebration of community and cultural diversity.

LITTLE BLUEBIRDS

little bluebirds is an online collection of creative ideas for parents to share with their 0-5 year olds at home. Each week a new post is added by one of the Bluebird early childhood educators and includes ideas and resources to support parents to bring music, art, nature and healthy food into their homes.

MEET, MOVE & MAKE

Meet, Move & Make is a weekly arts-based group session designed to support young parents to engage in joyful activities with their 0-5 year olds. The skills and ideas the parents learn during group time enrich their ongoing relationships with their children, turning one morning into a week full of learning opportunities. Based at the Norlane Child and Family Centre, Meet, Move & Make provides a learning environment for parent and child that supports child development, family relationships and effective parenting skills.

MUSICSPACE

MusicSpace is an on-going weekly program for people to get involved in music in all its forms. It is a welcoming space for people who experience disability or disadvantage in any form. Experienced musicians and Registered Music Therapists support participants to be involved with music, whether they want to learn an instrument, sing, write songs, play in a band, perform or just hang out with fellow music lovers. They have the opportunity to develop their potential as artists and to make friends along the way. Home to 'The Rockheads', Geelong's very own all-abilities band, MusicSpace responds to a critical gap in the local music scene.

NORTH CHILDREN'S CHOIR

NORTH Children's Choir was established in 2019, providing opportunities for talented young singers aged 6-11 years living in the northern suburbs of Geelong to embark on a high-level choral pathway. The choir grew out of the classroom singing programs Bluebird Foundation undertakes in partnership with schools in the 3214 postcode. Through a curriculum of music theory, vocal and performance skills, these young musicians worked with local choral educators to navigate a pathway to musical excellence which is not available through school and is financially out of reach of families. The young choristers and their families represent a wide range of cultural backgrounds, including Vietnamese, Liberian, Ghanaian, Karenni, Sudanese, Maori and both Indigenous and white Australian. Children connected with other singers across the Northern suburbs while building friendships among the diverse cultures. Families embraced the opportunity to see their children blossom in a musical environment that was nurturing yet challenging. The choir competed at eisteddfods, gaining a trophy and much praise, and delighted the Geelong community in a performance with Orchestra Geelong.

NORTH YOUTH THEATRE

North Youth Theatre is a newly established, open-access, youth theatre group. In 2019 young, culturally diverse artists came together weekly to create socially engaged theatre. With Artistic Director Dave Kelman's leadership, the group was constantly evolving and welcoming of new faces, while consisting of several original artists who have been involved in inspiring youth-led theatre productions in Geelong over the last five years.

Through each rehearsal, warm-up, improv, scene and script-writing process, weekly sessions provided a creative atmosphere that promoted artistic development, as well as hope, inclusion and unity. As an ensemble, North Youth Theatre recognises the impact of each performance, and hopes to constantly challenge minds, inspire the uninspired, and encourage conversation on current topics and issues that impact young people and the wider society. The major work for 2019 was 'Waiting For Something Better', a tragicomedy inspired by Samuel Beckett's, 'Waiting

For Godot' (1953). Two performances wowed the crowd at The Courthouse Theatre in December. The show was a unique take on the climate emergency in a strange and beautiful story that featured live music, rap and film, with all script and music developed by the ensemble.

PROPELLER

Propeller provides support pathways for disadvantaged young people to access creative arts workshops that align with their personal artistic interests and passions. A robust network of partnerships among social welfare agencies, schools and other community organisations ensures appropriate identification, recruitment and support of participants. In 2019, 44 places in the Workshops at Bluebird House program were provided at no cost to participants. This ensured access to a quality art program within a community setting, a model that embraces true social inclusion.

SENIORS FESTIVAL

The Geelong Seniors Festival is the largest community celebration for seniors in regional Victoria. A partner of the state-wide Victorian Seniors Festival, the Festival features a huge variety of community hosted events and experiences including workshops, dances, concerts, sporting activities and tours.

SENIORS FESTIVAL – A FENCE OF FIBRE ART

Intergenerational weaving workshops were held in the grounds of Newcomb Park Primary School. Children and seniors joined together with fibre artist, Caroline Hawkins, to learn how to create a beautiful ephemeral weaving installation out of natural materials.

TBA@NEWCOMB PARK

TBA is a wholistic program that aims to develop strong and creative family connections at primary school, while simultaneously supporting mental and physical health and wellbeing among children, families and the wider community. It uses a multi-pronged approach, firmly grounded in a background of multi-disciplinary research and links health to the arts in unique ways. In 2019 the program was launched at Newcomb Park Primary School.

FIRST STEPS

Supported play environments where 0-5 year olds and their parents/carers learn together and develop important skills through creative activities. First Steps in Music is an early childhood music education program based on the research and work of Dr John Feierabend. First Steps in Nature encourages child-led nature play that embraces the enormous world to be discovered within the school grounds.

FIRST STEPS (EXTENDED TRANSITION)

An extended transition-to-school program for parents/carers and their pre-prep children during the six months prior to school entry. Weekly music and nature parent-child sessions provide a gentle and positive introduction to the school environment, build relationships between parents and school staff and establish a culture of mutual respect and parent engagement.

CLASSLINKS

In-school singing sessions for prep students, their families and their teachers that create a partnership between home and school.

SINGINGLINKS


A comprehensive program of daily singing in the Prep-3 classrooms designed to support students to become tuneful, beatful and artful whilst promoting literacy, numeracy and social outcomes, and enhancing the capabilities of classroom teachers to use music as a tool for learning.

NATURELINKS

In 2019 a new outdoor learning program was designed for Newcomb Park Primary, providing an appropriate pathway from First Steps in Nature. Outdoor learning builds student resilience, while at the same time promoting improved literacy, numeracy and social outcomes, as in the music program. Prep students participated in a 30 minute facilitated nature session each week and Grade 1 – 3 students participated in a 15 minute facilitated nature session each week. Classroom teachers were given resources and encouragement to follow up with outdoor activities each day.

TBA NORTH

TBA North is a wholistic early childhood program based at primary schools in the Northern Suburbs of Geelong. In 2019 participating schools were St Thomas Aquinas, St Francis Xavier and Northern Bay College Peacock. The program is based on the successful TBA model that employs strategic, innovative arts interventions in an effort to redress poor educational outcomes. The program strives for effective, sustainable results for families, taking a two-generational approach and utilising an immersive mentoring model that targets teachers, caregivers and children simultaneously.

PLAYLINKS

PlayLinks was a weekly, facilitated art and music group session for parents/carers and their 0-5 year olds. Based at St Thomas Aquinas, St Francis Xavier and Northern Bay College Peacock Primary Schools, the program provided a learning environment for parent and child that supported child development, family relationships and linked play experiences to the school environment. The program was open to families living in the 3214 postcode.

SINGINGLINKS

A comprehensive program of daily singing in the Prep-4 classrooms designed to support students to become tuneful, beatful and artful whilst promoting literacy, numeracy and social outcomes, and enhancing the capabilities of classroom teachers to use music as a tool for learning.

MUSICLINKS

An extended transition-to-school program for parents/carers and their pre-prep children during the six months prior to school entry. Weekly music education parent-child sessions provided a gentle and positive introduction to the school environment, built relationships between parents and school staff and established a culture of mutual respect and parent engagement.

CLASSLINKS

An extended transition program where prep students and their parents/carers learned together in the classroom. This program supported the transition to school by creating a bridge from MusicLinks to SingingLinks and providing an opportunity for true parent engagement. The Bluebird facilitator educated parents and the classroom teacher throughout the program about early childhood music development and research.

WORKSHOPS AT BLUEBIRD HOUSE





TREASURER'S REPORT



Imagination Taking Flight

I am pleased to present Bluebird Foundation's 2019 financial statements which demonstrate the Foundation's ongoing growth and success in delivering programs that make a difference.

Total revenue increased by 5% to \$294,268. Seventy two percent of this revenue was received from generous philanthropic supporters and grants. 2019 saw increased numbers of community workshops conducted at Bluebird House, increasing revenue by 142%.

The growth in numbers of programs delivered in 2019 increased total expenditure by 51% to \$285,733, offset by increased revenue.

I acknowledge the work of our Program Manager, Bron Lawson, who has created strong partnerships with local artists and organisations, leading to great results for the Bluebird Foundation. Over 92% of total expenditure is fed directly into program delivery.

Net assets held by the Foundation are currently \$77,381.

Bluebird Foundation remains in a good financial position to continue to deliver on its charter.

Thank you to the volunteer Committee of Management for their ongoing support and to Glen Gardiner for auditing our 2019 finances pro bono.
